One interesting highlight of this year's show was the display of SWA history albums from the last 60 years. These were provided by SWA's historian Jeanine Liston. The albums covered all aspects of SWA from its founding up to 2010, after which most activities became digital. Some of the earliest entries were from 1938 covering the forerunner of all art groups in Clark County, the Vancouver Arts Guild which was active from 1938 through 1988. To summarize the history found in the albums: "everything old is new again".

Once again, we are on the lookout for suitable venues for classes, demos, workshops and instructors and facilitators. Pam Richey-Curtis is our Programs, Workshop and Venue committee member. Starting up the demos/classes and workshops in 2023 will be a major goal. In addition, we are working on the 2023 spring and fall shows, and the FVRL Volunteer show next summer. Our ongoing collaboration with CAN to revive the arts booth at the Clark County Fair and to find a suitable, long-term visual arts facility, is also moving forward. We'll keep you posted on the progress of the efforts as they develop.

Allan Oliver has been invited to exhibit his artwork at Niche's new location in downtown Vancouver (900 Washington St., #103).

Niche owner, Leah Jackson, is a former gallerist and has a strong commitment to local artists, as well as knowledge of wines from all over the world. As the Featured Artist for November and December, Allan will be showing his largest

canvas to date - 24" x 72" - as well as several new pieces in various sizes.

Allan started his art and design career in Latin America. Returning to the USA, he formed a graphics and public relations agency in Portland, Oregon, specializing in a wide range of cultural and social organizations. Discovering the artistic uses of computer imaging, he developed a business creating hand-printed fabrics. He marketed the designs at his gallery, Onda, on Alberta Street in Portland and later exhibited primarily Latino artists. He chaired the Arts Commission at Trinity Episcopal Cathedral in Portland. His current artwork explores acrylic liquid art and his paintings have been exhibited at the CAVE gallery in Vancouver as well as in Society of Washington Artists and Mosaic Arts Alliance shows.





Artist Spotlight:

Member Richard Britschgi, Fort Vancouver Library Show

I have lived in La Center Washington with my wife Chris for over 24 years. I retired in 2015 after a 30-year corporate life. I picked up lapidary after I retired and haven't looked back. There is something about rocks that seem to work on everyone's imagination. I turned my shop into a lapidary shop and started cutting, tumbling, and polishing rocks. We love camping and have spent our days in the desert with my sister Rachael and brother-in-law Mike digging for various rocks and petrified wood. We basically collaborated together to learn the processes and 7 years later, we have produced



some very unique lapidary pieces. I also recently joined some art organizations and have done collaborative work with my friend Connie Ford (basketry). All the weaving and basketry you see in the photos are done by Connie.

As far as lapidary work, the most common process is to cut slabs or gems and polish or sell the slabs to people that produce jewelry. I started tumbling river rocks from local creeks and I found some rocks too big to tumble and polish. So bought a rock saw and started cutting the larger ones; that is when the rocks started talking to me. (No I am not cuckoo!) After cutting pieces, they would look like a wing of some type or a face so to speak. So I went with it! For example, if you look at the photos of my work, I made a rock lobster, the whole lobster is from one egg that I cut, and a couple of the slabs looked like lobster claws.....ala rock lobster!


